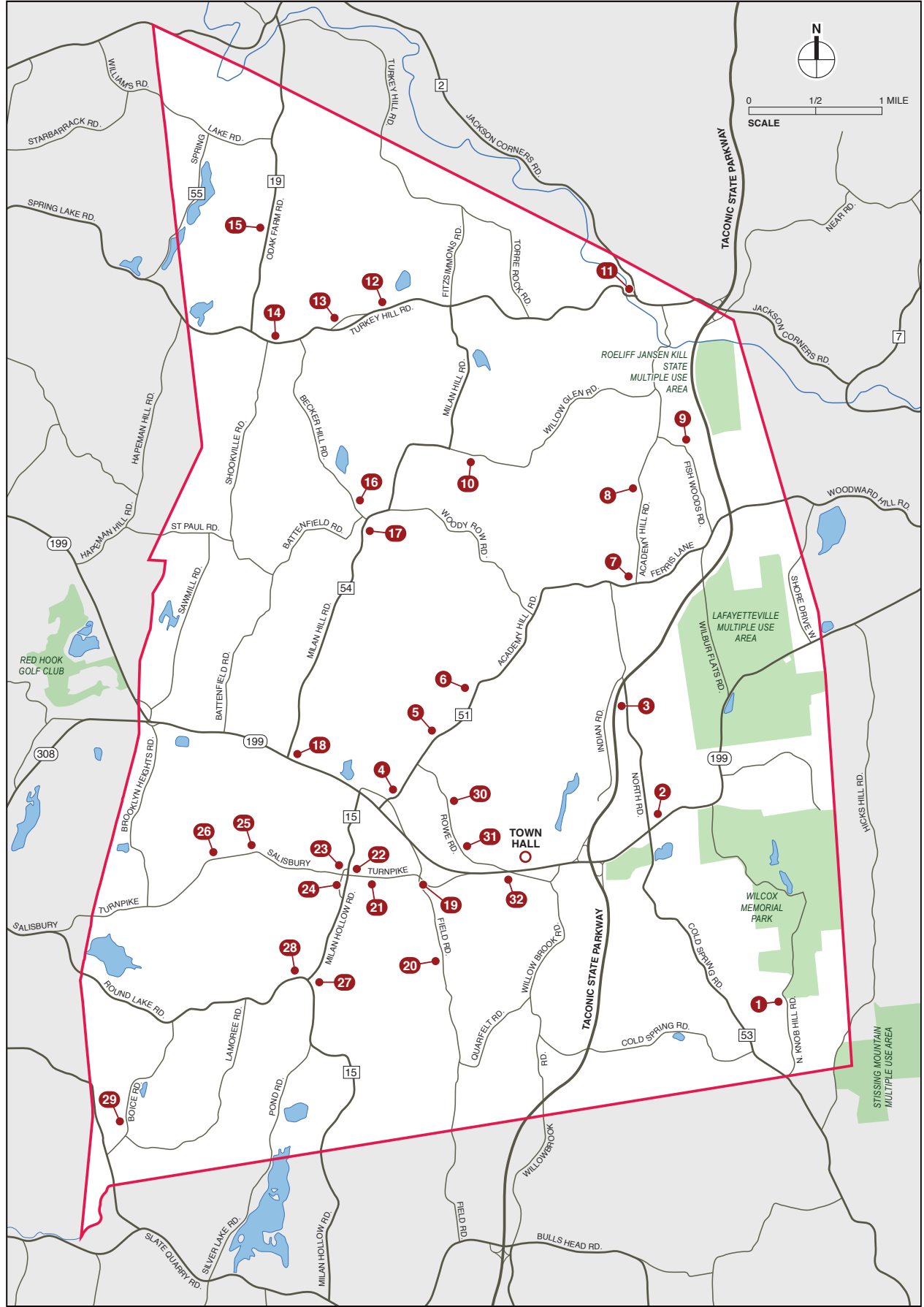

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1 Frederick P Wilcox Estate

This 1919-renovated 1858 farm-house was the main home on the 620-acre “Oakdale” estate, created from five smaller farms from 1911 to 1919. Now Wilcox Park



2 Lafayette House

Built around 1837, once served as a hotel, store and tavern. Named for French Revolutionary War hero, the Marquis de Lafayette



3 Travis House

This early 1800s “Eyebrow Colonial” is typical of the basic style of house most common in Milan at its founding in 1818



4 Number 4 District Briggs School

One of ten such single-room schoolhouses in Milan before centralization. Academy Hill Road, circa 1876



5 Haviland House

Farm house down long driveway built in the mid-1800s. Part of a large farm



6 Rowe Family House

On Academy Hill Road, a yellow “Eyebrow Colonial” house, circa 1867



7 D. Rowe House

On Academy Hill Road, home built by Rowe family member, almost identical to #31 Mark Rowe House



8 Pells Homestead

On Academy Hill Road, perhaps the earliest of the Pells homesteads was built around 1790. House is tan with red roof, white fence and barn close to the road



9 Pells Homes

On Fish Woods Road, one of two homes occupied by John and Jeremiah Pells, adjacent to former mill operating on the nearby stream



10 Campisi House

On Willow Glen Road and overlooking a pond, this house was built circa 1795 by Willem Herrmance and renovated in 1936 by Jules Campisi



11 Old Gaddis Store

At the corner of Turkey Hill Road and Jackson Corners Road, this Colonial Inn was once used as a stage coach stop, post office, and doctor's office. Built around 1773



12 Feller Home

An old Colonial house on Turkey Hill Road with a large front porch and old blue truck parked in front, built in the mid-1880s



13 Fulton Homestead

Built in 1858 by E. Fulton and located on Turkey Hill Road, this “Eyebrow Colonial” was in the Fulton family for generations



14 Hapeman and Fulton House

On Turkey Hill Road, this large house—hotel in appearance with a white fence in front—was built by Hapeman and Fulton circa 1876



15 Odak Farm

On Odak Farm Road, this Colonial house used to be owned by N. and E. Phillips, circa 1858. Well in front with barns on both sides of the road



16 Peter Barker Farm

On Becker Hill Road, this Colonial house was built circa 1867



17 Philip Teats Homestead

Located on Milan Hill Road, this Colonial house was built circa 1867



18 Philip Teats House

At the corner of Milan Hill Road and Route 199, this house was built by Philip Teats circa 1795 and became the Nathaniel Morehouse farm circa 1805



19 Jeremiah Link Homestead

Located at the corner of Salisbury Turnpike and Field Road, this house was built in the 1870s and was operated as a gristmill, tannery, and large farm



20 Robert E. Thorn Farm

On Field Road, this pre-1787 property was bought by R.E. Thorn in 1832 and additions were made to this white house. The property was bought at auction by Carl Jacoby in 1899



21 Stephen Thorn Home

On Salisbury Turnpike, the house was built by Stephen Thorn in 1818 and was Milan's first Supervisor



22 Herrick Thorne Home

At the corner of Salisbury Turnpike and Milan Hollow Road is the Herrick Thorne home which later became Camp Habonim (presently under renovation)



23 Case's Corners

North of Salisbury Turnpike, view all buildings in this area. Small structure pictured was designed similar to Rowe Church and was once Dr. Herrick's office



24 Case's Corners

South of Salisbury Turnpike, this section of Case's Corners includes a house and red barn and once included a sawmill, blacksmith shop, and a Templars lodge



25 M. Clarke Farm

On Salisbury Turnpike, the “Eyebrow Colonial” house has a green roof and adjacent barn and pond. Originally the Ostrander Farm in 1858, the property has views of the Catskills Mountains



26 B. Clarke Farm

On Salisbury Turnpike, the house was built around 1858 and has a spectacular view of the Catskills Mountains



27 Wildey Farm

Situated on Milan Hollow Road, this house and farm has been in the James Wildey family since 1806 and has a New York State historic marker posted in front



28 J.W. Yates House

On Round Lake Road, a sign says Milan Hall Farm. The white Colonial house and adjacent barns were built circa 1876



29 Boice House

A grey Colonial with black shutters, this Boice Road house was built circa 1867 and became the property of H.I. and G.A. Boice in 1876



30 Jackson House

On Rowe Road, Henry & Almira Jackson raised 12 children after buying farmland and building this house around 1867



31 Mark Rowe House

Situated on Rowe Road, this Georgian Style house was built circa 1819 by Mark Rowe and was once a farm with an Angus cattle operation



32 Rowe Church

On the south side of Route 199 near Rowe Road, this Methodist church and parsonage were built in the mid-1800s
